#### The Beginnings of the National Pre-school Playgroup Movement in the 1960s

Belle Tutaev and her family lived in a flat in Central London and after her son went to school her 3 year old daughter Mary was lonely. She wanted friends to play with and the family had been turned down from any state nursery education because they weren't needy enough. With 6 friends Belle managed to hire a local hall, initially for two hours. Mary loved it, playing alongside the other children. She didn't realise how extraordinary it was at that time to have that kind of provision.

Belle was a trained nurse and her husband at that time was a journalist In August 1961, she decided to test National Opinion and The Guardian newspaper published a letter from her asking for signatures to a national petition appealing for 'more nursery schools and play facilities for children under 5'. Belle's inspired response to the many concerned replies she received was to set up a journal called Contact that linked parents, mostly mothers, from all over the UK, and helped to share information about how to set up and run playgroups.

In July 1962, 150 of these people met together and formed the Pre-school Playgroup Association. The PPA had an enormous influence on the lives of thousands of children and their families. It was a unique organisation at that time, based in local communities, but linked nationwide. Volunteers were the key driving force in the PPA, supported by paid staff at all levels. There had been stumbling blocks on the way for Belle but she was determined! She knew what was needed but all of the government ministers and politicians she met at that time were men who didn't see any need for change. Despite this by the middle of the 1960's, there were over two thousand members of the PPA.

The PPA, later the Pre-school Learning Alliance (PLA), gained in national standing too. It was in the 1990s that the campaign to provide more nursery education and pre-school playgroup provision for the under-fives really took off. Labour, when it came to power in 1997, pledged to provide a nursery place for every three and four year-old whose parents wanted them to have one.

The Pre-school Learning Alliance realises the debt of gratitude it owes to Belle Tutaev and people like her who have fought for better provision for the under-fives over the decades. Marwood Pre-school carries on today, with its Outstanding Ofsted standard. It still delivers a service for the community by the community. The parents, too many to name, throughout the 40 years have played a vital role in how this provision is delivered to their children.







### The First Year by Dorothy Croft

Marwood playgroup was started in 1975 for reasons that will probably resonate today as they did then: mums feeling isolated from other adults, knowing their children would benefit from interaction with others.

Sally McDonald and I both lived in Kingsheanton at the time, started chatting and came up with the idea of starting a playgroup. We began by knocking on doors. The first call was to Carol Edwards in Guineaford who was very enthusiastic - a fabulous start to our enquiries! From there we enlisted Sarah Bailey and Jan Beaman, both from Prixford - people full of energy and ideas.

We registered the group with the Pre-School Playgroup Association, paid the insurance and over a time attended courses.

We were starting the project with no grants and no money at all! Our first job was to find a venue. Marwood Church Hall, at the time a chilly, damp place, was selected as the venue with space both for children and equipment. What equipment? Well - we raided our own boxes and headed for every jumble sale we heard of. We bought decorators tables and cut the legs short so that the children could paint, junk model etc. We held coffee mornings and Bring & Buy sales to raise money for toys and resources. The equipment, toys, trucks cars etc. were all kept in the store below the hall and had to be brought in from outside every session regardless of the weather. On some of the coldest days, before the overhead heaters were installed in the hall, some sessions would be held at Highfield, in Guineaford. At least Carol Edwards didn't have to go out to supervise a session on those cold days.

At each session there would be a playgroup leader and playgroup assistant who were eventually paid to run the sessions once there was enough money coming in. There would be a mother helper on a rota basis. Our sessions were always structured but giving the children freedom to take part in everything they chose. We usually had a theme for the week which might encourage children to bring objects in to 'show and tell' or be included in pictures or gluing. We had a big rug in the book corner, and Sarah Bailey made a long snake cushion for comfort. There was a 'house' corner which might also be a shop or a hospital. There was a rail of dressing up clothes and some hats too which the children loved. There would always be painting, sticking or junk modelling at every session. We always celebrated special days by making cards for Mother's Day, Father's Day etc. when all the children would be encouraged to 'make'. Lots of jigsaw puzzles were acquired and other board games to stimulate little minds. There would be playdough and sometimes clay modelling. We had a wooden train set and a big plastic train set. We would set the tracks out to allow lots of children to have their own part of the track. We had a garage and cars. There was a sand pit which would be alternated with water play. We would clear part of the hall at some point so the children could have a noisy time with ride-on trucks and cars. We would also play games with them.

About 10.30am we would have a break when all the children would sit down on the snake and take part. We would have milk, delivered by George Steadman, and biscuits and fruit. This is the time we would sing songs and rhymes, before going off to play some more. Towards the end of the morning the children would all go to the book corner for a story which would end the session. All of this happened at every session.

#### We put a lot into each session and hoped the children got a lot out of the experience too. DC









In the photos of that first Christmas 1975 you will see Sarah Bailey and Jan Beaman in the centre of the photo on the left and Carol Edwards on the photo above. These were, with Dorothy Croft, the mainstay of the original group of parents who started Marwood Playgroup.

For the next 20 years parents and children learnt together and followed the ethos set up by the original leaders. Mums with many skills put themselves forward (sometimes encouraged!) as leaders and assistants and the weekly mix of personalities reflected this. At one time Mrs Adams came as a 'wonderful Granny', who read stories all the time, when Rosemary Booth was supervisor! Dr Smart's Garden and feeding the ducks was a favourite place for breaktime when the weather was good but photographic evidence is sparse during these first years without digital cameras!

Mums rarely went back to their original jobs as these were only kept open for 3 months after the baby's birth - an impossibly short time. Many parents were on the supervising rota in the early years and everyone benefited from the experiences, friendships and sharing of ideas. We also tried to give our own children at least one session a week without us being there. Many aspects of Marwood life haven't changed over this time but the technology certainly has. None of us had a mobile phone or a computer in the beginning so signal was never an issue. Landline or nothing!

Starting the Playgroup required a lot of commitment from a dedicated group of people. For the first two terms nobody took any wages and the children paid 35p per session. After Easter 1976 a supervisor was paid £1.30 per session and an assistant £1.05. Another parent did a duty at each session as well.

Children started at Playgroup when they were 3 and in 1975 children went to school the term after they were 5. By 1978 children could start school the term they turned 5 and by 1985 there was a 2 point entry and all the younger children in the school year had the option to start after Christmas. By 2010 there was the option of the single point of entry into school in the September for all children who were 5 during the school year. This meant there were significant fluctuations of numbers to account for and cater for each year.

### Pre-school 40 Years On!

Marwood is a small, friendly non-profit making organisation run by an elected committee of parents. (There is also a private nursery, Springfield, in Marwood, and children often successfully attend both settings as they approach school age if Marwood is their school of choice.) Marwood Preschool is a registered member of Ofsted and member of the Pre-school Learning Alliance. We receive Early Years Funding for eligible three and four year olds. The Pre-school runs 3 mornings a week and we accept a maximum of 17 children at each session at Marwood Methodist Hall.

The aim is to provide a safe, happy and child centred environment with the objective being to ensure that by the time our children transfer to the reception year at school, they have made good progress against the Early Years Outcomes.



#### What We Do

A typical morning starts with structured free play, arts and crafts and then our main activity for the day. The children are encouraged to help tidy up and take turns to help prepare the fruit for the snack break and lay the table. Children are offered milk or water to drink and are offered a wide variety of fruit and salad to eat. When the children have finished their break, we have circle time and talk about the topic of the day. The daily and weekly plans are displayed.

The Pre-school has access to outdoor areas and we try to get outside every morning, weather permitting. The children play games, ride bikes, scooters and cart.

#### **Our Objectives**

Staff act as key workers, each with responsibility for a small number of children. This ensures that the particular needs of every child are recognised through close observation and liaison with parents and carers to provide individual care and attention for the children. We are keen to integrate children with special needs where our facilities and room can effectively meet the needs of the individual child.

We pride ourselves on excellent staff to child ratio which is possible because of a parent help rota. The parent help rota supports the staff and also enables parents and carers to get involved and see what we are all about. All helpers are CRB checked in line with Ofsted requirements. In conjunction with the toddler group we hold regular fundraising and social events. These events are an important part of our philosophy, helping to build a sense of friendship and community, as well as generating some extra income needed to buy new equipment or fund outings.

#### Toddler Group

Marwood toddler group is a friendly, informal group who meet every Tuesday morning in term time, between 9 and 11 o'clock, at Marwood Church Hall. The toddler group is suitable for children aged between 0 and 3 years. We have various toys, craft based activities, ride on toys, puzzles and play dough. We also have a nursery rhyme sing a long, musical instruments and a story time. A snack and drink is provided for the children and carers which is all covered by a small charge. The Toddler Group is strongly linked to Marwood Pre-school.

Many of you reading this short 'snapshot' history of Marwood Playgroup/Pre-school played a significant role in keeping the group going for its first 40 years. As well as those working with the children, if you served on the Committee it will have consumed hours of your time, especially as Chair, Administrator, Secretary or Treasurer. It may not have always been easy but many lasting friendships have been made, both between the children and adults. We have all learnt from each other and benefited in ways that may not easily be measured by an OFSTED Inspection and possibly will not be recognised until we are much older either!!
